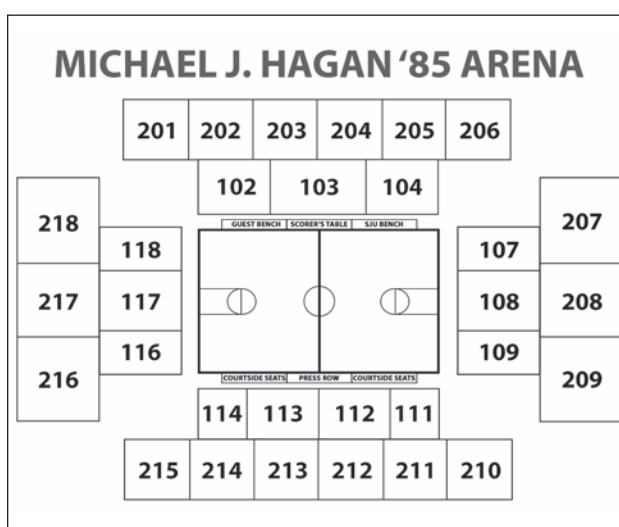

Head Coach • 18th Season
Saint Joseph's '91, MBA '93

The all-time leader in wins at Saint Joseph's, **Cindy Griffin** enters her 18th season as head coach of the Hawks. A 1991 and 1993 graduate of SJU, Griffin (nee Anderson) has compiled an overall record of 357-261 in 20 seasons as a head coach, and a 309-228 record over 17 years at Hawk Hill that has included 12 postseason appearances.

The eighth coach in NCAA Division I history to lead her alma mater to the NCAA Tournament as a player and a coach, Griffin's squads have posted six 20-win seasons and six victories over nationally-ranked teams, while her players have been honored as Atlantic 10 All-Conference performers 19 times and 16 have gone on to play professionally.

Guiding a veteran squad, Griffin brought SJU back to the postseason in 2017-18 as the Hawks advanced to Second Round of the WNIT and finished with a 19-15 overall record, marking the most games played (34) in a single-season in team history. Capturing the Hawk Classic title in November, the Hawks battled back from injuries during conference play to five of their last six conference games and carried that momentum up to the title game of the A-10 Championship. Along the way, senior Chelsea Woods earned All-Big 5 First Team and A-10 All-Conference Third Team honors, with junior Sarah Veilleux being selected Big 5 Scholar-Athlete, named to the All-Big 5 Second Team and joined graduate student Amanda Fioravanti on the A-10 All-Academic Team.

Behind a resilient team, the 2016-17 Hawks battled back from a slow start to become one of the top teams in the Atlantic 10. Finishing third in the conference standings, the Hawks advanced to the semifinals of the A-10 Championship and earned the program's 10th Postseason WNIT berth. Individually, Chelsea Woods was named an A-10 All-Conference honoree and was selected to the All-Big 5 Second Team. Joining Woods on the All-Big 5 Second Team, Adashia Franklyn also garnered Big

5 most Improved Player accolades, while Sarah Veilleux was recognized as the Big 5 Scholar Athlete.

Behind a pair of 1,000-point scorers in seniors Sarah Fairbanks and Ciara Andrews in 2015-16, Saint Joseph's finished tied for sixth in the A-10 behind a strong finish to the regular season. Finishing among the attendance leaders in the conference, the Hawks added to their mantle as they claimed the Hawk Classic title. Additionally, Fairbanks was named the Big 5's Scholar-Athlete, while sophomore Chelsea Woods was selected the Big 5's Most Improved Player.

Backed by First Team All-Big 5 selection Natasha Cloud, the Hawks earned a share of the Big 5 title in 2014-15. Cloud, who garnered A-10 All-Conference First Team and All-Defensive Team accolades, also became just the third SJU player to be selected in the WNBA Draft as she was picked by the Washington Mystics in the second round in 2015.

Following up their A-10 Championship the season prior, the 2013-14 Hawks continued to prove themselves as one of the top programs nationally as they earned an at-large bid to the NCAA Tournament and advanced to the Second Round for just the seventh time in team history. Led by Erin Shields and Cloud, Saint Joseph's earned its fifth straight postseason bid and claimed its first outright Philadelphia Big 5 title since 2000-01.

Under Griffin's leadership, Saint Joseph's posted one of its most memorable seasons in team history in 2012-13 as the Hawks claimed the Atlantic 10 Championship for just the third time and earned the automatic NCAA Tournament bid. Led by a senior class that had advanced to the postseason every year, the Hawks finished with a 23-9 record that included wins over #5 Maryland and #11 Dayton.

In addition to the team's success, a trio of Hawks were singled out for their performances, led by NCAA Woman of the Year nominee Chatilla van Grinsven. With Griffin's guidance, van Grinsven turned in one of the more dominant seasons in recent SJU history, becoming just the fifth player in SJU history to average a double-double for the year en route to being named to the A-10 All-Conference First Team and as the Big 5 Player of the Year. The duo of backcourt mates Shields and Cloud helped propel SJU to new heights, with Shields garnering A-10 and Big 5 Most Improved Player honors and I-AAA distinction, while Cloud was named the Most Outstanding Player of the 2013 A-10 Championship.

Backed by a veteran-laden team in 2011-12, the Hawks earned their third-straight WNIT berth and posted their most wins (22) since the 2003-04 season. Moving into second place in career victories at her alma mater, Griffin picked up her 200th win as the Hawks topped Boston University in the opening game of the WNIT on March 15, 2012. Leading the Hawks to a 15-4 mark at home, she helped Saint Joseph's become one of the more efficient teams in the nation, ranking fourth in fewest turnovers per game (12.5), 26th in three-point percentage (.348) and 39th in field goal percentage (.423).

Individually, senior Michelle Baker and Kelly Cavallo had breakout years, both garnering All-Big 5 honors. Behind Griffin's teaching, Baker went on to be named to the A-10 All-Conference Second Team and capped her career as SJU's then all-time leader in games played (127) while ranking in the top 20 for scoring and field goals made. After seeing limited time as a freshman, Cavallo developed into one of the top post players in the A-10, leading SJU and finishing in the top five of the conference in rebounding, blocked shots and field goal percentage. With Griffin's aid, Cavallo finished her career second all-time in blocks and 11th in rebounding at SJU.

Returning just one starter for the 2010-11 season, the Hawks quickly jelled under Griffin's guidance as they went on to win 20 games, earned the program's 700th victory, and advanced to the second round of the WNIT. Led by All-Big 5 honorees Baker and Katie Kuester, Saint Joseph's had its most efficient offensive showing since 2002-03, as the Hawks finished 60th in the nation in field goal percentage (42.1).

Additionally, several Hawks were honored for outstanding seasons in 2010-11, headlined by sophomore Ashley Prim becoming the first SJU player to be named Atlantic 10 Sixth Player of the Year. Baker became just the second Hawk to be named to the A-10 All-Defensive Team, while freshman Erin Shields became the sixth player Griffin has coached to A-10 All-Rookie Team honors.

Earning a postseason berth for the first time in two years, the Hawks surpassed predictions in 2009-10 as they finished tied for fourth in the Atlantic 10 after being picked to finish ninth. After opening the season with a 3-7 mark, Griffin saw her team begin to click at the end of the non-conference schedule as SJU claimed the 19th Annual Hawk Classic title and worked its way to .500 by the second week of the Atlantic 10 slate. Posting a 9-5 mark against conference opponents, Griffin hit two milestones during A-10 play, earning her 150th win at Saint Joseph's in a victory against Dayton and earning her 200th coaching win against George Washington. The Hawks would go on to earn the program's seventh WNIT bid, and play the first postseason game at Hagan Arena.

In 2008-09, Griffin undertook arguably her toughest season to date as Saint Joseph's played every contest away from Hawk Hill for the first time in program history. And in typical SJU fashion, Griffin got her team to respond as Saint Joseph's went on to post an 8-5 record at home venues and earn its first Big 5 title since 2000-01. Individually five Hawks posted career bests in scoring, with Brittany Ford and Mariame Djouara both earning All-Big 5 Second Team honors.

Relying heavily on underclassmen in 2007-08, Griffin guided her Hawks to another winning season, including crowns at the Brown Basketball Classic and the Hilton Philadelphia Hawk Classic. Among the wins, Saint Joseph's posted its biggest win over a non-conference ranked opponent since the 1984-85, topping #15 Auburn for the Hawk Classic title.

Despite losing several experienced players prior to the 2006-07 season, Griffin had her team peaking at the right time. Playing Griffin's style of hard-nosed defense and persistent offense, the Hawks advanced to the Atlantic 10 Championship game, including the program's first win over a top 10 opponent (#8 George Washington) since 1992 along the way. Saint Joseph's capped the season with its fifth WNIT appearance in six years and tied the SJU record for games played in a season with 33.

Fueled by a collection of newcomers and a developed core of upperclassmen, Griffin led the Hawks back to national prominence in 2005-06. The Crimson and Gray engineered the nation's best turnaround (13 games) and received votes in the national polls for the first time since 2003-04. The Hawks advanced to the semifinals of the A-10 Championship and earned a berth in the WNIT.

With the loss of four 1,000-point scorers, the 2004-05 Hawks showed their true colors down the stretch, earning a hard-fought victory over La Salle in the opening round of the Atlantic 10 Championship and coming within 10 points of 16th-ranked, and eventual A-10 Champion, Temple.

Led by six seniors, the 2004 team went 22-11 and advanced to the WNIT Elite Eight. Saint Joseph's finished second in the A-10 East and dropped a heartbreaker in the Atlantic 10 Championship to Temple. Four Hawk seniors reached the 1,000-point plateau, marking just the eighth time in NCAA history that a quartet of players had reached the milestone in the same season. Erin Brady, Irina Krasnoshiok, Stephanie (Graff) McCaffrey and Amra Mehmedic went on to sign professional contracts.





Following a memorable first year at the helm of her alma mater, Griffin upped the ante in her second season by capturing 2003 Atlantic 10 Coach of the Year honors after guiding the Hawks to a 19-11 record. The team sprinted to the conference's Eastern Division title and earned a berth in the WNIT for the second straight season, despite the departure of SJU's all-time leading scorer and a non-conference schedule that ranked fourth nationally.

Griffin helped to reinvigorate the SJU program in her first season, leading the squad to a 24-8 record and the second round of the WNIT. She capitalized on the team's tradition of scrappy play and rugged defense, while releasing the reins and allowing the team to play a more up-tempo style on the offensive end of the floor. The Hawks finished the year among the national leaders in nine different categories and paced the nation in free throw percentage for the second straight year.

Following her playing career, Griffin spent the 1992-93 season as a graduate assistant at her alma mater. She then accepted an assistant's spot at Vanderbilt University from 1993-95 under former Saint Joseph's head coach Jim Foster. Foster recruited Griffin to SJU and coached her during her playing career on Hawk Hill.

In her two years as an assistant at Vanderbilt, the Commodores finished 53-15 overall, won the 1995 SEC championship and reached the NCAA Sweet 16 both seasons. In addition to coaching responsibilities, she was the co-director of the Vanderbilt Basketball Camp and the director of the Black & Gold Club.

Griffin left Vanderbilt after the 1995 season to become an assistant coach at Loyola Maryland. She spent three seasons as an assistant under Patty Coyle before being promoted to associate head coach in 1998. Griffin was promoted to the position of head women's basketball coach at Loyola Maryland midway through the 1998-99 season. She was the seventh-youngest head coach in Division I at the time. Griffin – who was named head coach five games into the season as Coyle left for an assistant coach position with the WNBA's New York Liberty – kept the Greyhounds' momentum going as Loyola Maryland won a team-record 21 games that year. Overall she compiled a record of 48-33 during her tenure at the Baltimore school, guiding the squad to the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference semifinals all three years.

One of the top playmakers in Saint Joseph's history, Griffin starred for the Hawks from 1987-88 through 1991-92 (missing the 1988-89 season due to injury). A three-time team captain, Griffin finished her career with 662 points, 278 rebounds, 510 assists and 197 steals. She currently ranks fourth on SJU's all-time assist list.

As a junior in 1990-91, she played in 1,178 out of a possible 1,200 minutes to set the school record for minutes played in a single season. The Hawks made three NCAA Tournament appearances and posted three straight 20-win seasons during her playing career. A two-time Second Team All-Big 5 choice, as well as a Third Team All-Atlantic 10 pick as a senior, she was inducted into the Saint Joseph's Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in 1998.

A native of Maple Glen, Pa., Griffin played her high school basketball for Bishop McDevitt, winning two Philadelphia Catholic League titles. A 1987 graduate of McDevitt, she was inducted into its Athletic Hall of Fame in 1997, and in 2002, received the Philadelphia Catholic League's alumni achievement award. She earned a bachelor's degree in accounting from Saint Joseph's in 1991 and completed her M.B.A. from SJU in 1993. She resides in Conshohocken, Pa., with her husband, Curtis, and children, Kaylie, Hannah and Curtis, Jr.

Susan Lavin, the all-time leading scorer in Saint Joseph's basketball history, enters her fourth season as associate head coach and 16th season overall on the coaching staff at Hawk Hill.

A 2002 graduate of Saint Joseph's, Lavin (nee Moran) is responsible for guard development, opponent scouting and international recruiting. Lavin, who began working with the guards after spending five seasons working with the post players, has seen multiple players garner individual honors.

Under her guidance, 16 Hawks have received All-Big 5 honors, nine have earned Atlantic 10 All-Conference distinctions, and four were named to



A-10 All-Rookie Team selections. Additionally, 2015 graduate Natasha Cloud was drafted by the Washington Mystics in the second round of the 2015 WNBA Draft.

Serving as the team's international recruiter, Lavin has been instrumental in helping the Hawks more than double the amount of foreign-born players during her tenure from seven to 16.

As a Hawk, the Tullamore, Ireland, native started all 122 games in her career and is the only player in SJU history to lead the team in both scoring and rebounding for four consecutive seasons. An Honorable Mention All-American by the *Associated Press* and the WBCA in 2002, Lavin scored 2,340 points and holds seven other school records, including career marks for free throws made and field goals made. She ranked fourth in the nation in scoring (23.3 points per game) as a senior.

Lavin was named the Atlantic 10 and Philadelphia Big 5 Player of the Year in 2002 and the Rookie of the Year by both in 1999. She was also a finalist for the Senior Class Award during her final year. The epitome of the term "student-athlete," Lavin was a two-time Academic All-American and was twice the Atlantic 10's Student-Athlete of the Year. Saint Joseph's made two trips to the NCAA Tournament and one to the WNIT during her time on Hawk Hill.

On February 24, 2008, Lavin's accomplishments on the court were recognized by the Hawks as she became just the second woman in Saint Joseph's basketball history to have her jersey (10) retired. Lavin was later inducted into the Saint Joseph's Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in the spring of 2008, the Philadelphia Big 5 Hall of Fame in January of 2009, the SJU Athletic Hall of Fame in October 2010 and was named a member of the inaugural A-10 Legends Class of 2013.



Following her college career, Lavin spent time playing for the WNBA's New York Liberty and professionally in Spain, New Zealand and Australia. In 2005, Lavin earned MVP honors of the Women's National Basketball League in New Zealand after leading the Canterbury Wildcats to the league title. In the summer of 2006, Lavin earned MVP honors of the Queensland Australia Basketball League as a member of the Rockhampton Cyclones. She returned to the hardwood as a member of the Irish National Team at the European Qualifiers.

An active member of the Women's Basketball Coaches Association, Lavin earned her master's of business administration from Saint Joseph's in December of 2007. The daughter of Ethna and Martin Moran, Susan and her husband, Greg, welcomed daughter Aislinn this past Spring.

Entering his fourth season as an assistant coach on Cindy Griffin's staff at Saint Joseph's is **John Hampton**. Over his first three season, Hampton has helped the Hawks to a pair of postseason berths and a 50-45 over-all record.

With over 20 years of successful basketball experience, including seven years as a coach, Hampton came to Saint Joseph's in 2015-16 after spending the prior year as an assistant at Rider under head coach Lynn Milligan.

In his first season with the Hawks, Hampton helped guard Ciara Andrews garner All-Big 5 honors while reaching the 1,000-point mark for her career along the way. Additionally, guard/forward Chelsea Woods flourished under his guidance as she was named Big 5 Most Improved Player.



In 2016-17, Hampton saw the SJU backcourt continue to improve as the Hawks posted their most assists (457) since 2014-15 and most steals (202) since 2012-13. Individually, Woods earned both Atlantic 10 All-Conference Second Team and All-Big 5 Second Team honors, while Alyssa Monaghan received nation recognition during the season as HERO Sports Best Atlantic 10 Underclassman Guard honors.

With Hampton's guidance, Saint Joseph's captured the Hawk Classic crown, advanced to the title game of the A-10 Championship and posted a victory over Seton Hall in the Postseason WNIT. Individually, Sarah Veilleux was named to the All-Big 5 Second Team, while Monaghan etched her name in Saint Joseph's among the all-time leaders free throw percentage and three pointers made.

While with the Broncos in 2014-15, Hampton helped the team finish seventh in the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference, and saw four Rider student-athletes garnered MAAC All-Academic Team honors.

Prior to joining the Broncos, Hampton served as head coach at Clarkson University from 2010 to 2014 where he guided the Golden Knights to their most wins in a decade with 10 in 2013-14. On the court, six players garnered All-Liberty honors, highlighted by 2012-13 Rookie of the Year Ashley Loggins, while off the court, 10 players were named to the All-Liberty Academic Team. Along with assisting in fundraising campaigns and helping manage academic support programs, Hampton graduated from the NCAA's selective ACE (Achieving Coaching Excellence) program for Black Coaches and Administrators in 2013. Before taking over as head coach, Hampton served as a graduate assistant with the Golden Knights from 2008 to 2010.



A 2008 graduate of Mansfield University, Hampton joined the men's basketball program as a walk-on and went on to earn the team's MVP twice (2007, 2008) and was selected a PSAC All-Conference honoree as a senior. He would earn a bachelor's degree in business administration in 2008 and earned his master's degree in organizational leadership from SUNY-Potsdam in 2010.

Hampton currently resides in Philadelphia with his wife, Kismet, and daughters, Eden and Ivy.

One of the most famous mascots in college sports, the Saint Joseph's Hawk celebrates its 63rd anniversary in 2018-19. The Hawk is best known for staying in constant motion by flapping its wings throughout every basketball game and representing the Saint Joseph's motto, "The Hawk Will Never Die."

Jim Brennan originated the idea for a hawk as mascot during the 1954-55 season. Brennan, an ex-Marine and SJU cheerleader, at first wanted to secure an actual hawk, but later switched to the costume idea. The student government raised the 120 dollars needed to buy the initial costume, which Brennan donned for three years. He made his debut as the Hawk on January 4, 1956, a 69-56 win over La Salle at the Palestra. Since then, and including this season, a total of 31 SJU students have donned the costume. The Hawk has not missed a men's basketball game since that first season in 1955-56. The Hawk, who was present at most women's basketball games, became a mainstay in 1989. Since then, 15 SJU students have donned the costume.

In addition to the constant flapping, the Hawk is also recognized by its "flying" in figure eights around the court during timeouts. Years ago, ESPN used a "flap-o-meter" on the national telecast of a Saint Joseph's game to estimate that the Hawk flaps its wings 3,500 times during a regulation game.

The Hawk is unique because it is one of the few mascots in the nation that travels to every game, and the student who holds the position gains a tuition scholarship. The student, who is selected through an interview process during the previous spring semester, also serves as a team manager for the men's basketball team and travels with the squad.

The most decorated mascot in the country, The Hawk has garnered numerous accolades in its history. In 2013-14, NCAA.com named The Hawk as "College Basketball's Best Tradition". The Sporting News, Sports Illustrated, Sports Illustrated for Kids, Street & Smith's Basketball Yearbook and ESPN College

Basketball magazine have selected it as the nation's top mascot. Eastern Basketball tabbed The Hawk as the Atlantic 10 Conference's best mascot, while The Hawk won a "Best of Philly" award from Philadelphia Magazine in 2003-04. The Hawk was selected as a 2008 nominee for the Mascot Hall of Fame.

Saint Joseph's athletic teams have been recognized with the nickname "Hawks" since 1929. At that time, the school's yearbook editor, Charlie Dunn, initiated a contest among the student body for a symbol. More than 100 submissions were narrowed to two, with "Hawks" winning out over "Grenadiers" (World War I soldiers who specialized in tossing grenades) by a slim margin in the final vote.

John Gallagher '31, a catcher on the Saint Joseph's baseball team, submitted the winning suggestion. He won a sweater with a special Saint Joseph's monogram for selecting the winning name. According to the Student Annual, the nickname was appropriate because it typified "the fighting spirit of our crimson and gray athletes and it is suggestive of the aerial attack which has made our football team famous." Ironically, football was discontinued at Saint Joseph's following the 1939 season.

But it has been the connection with the storied tradition of the Saint Joseph's men's and women's basketball programs that has given The Hawk mascot its prominence on the national level, making it one of the most recognized mascots in college athletics.

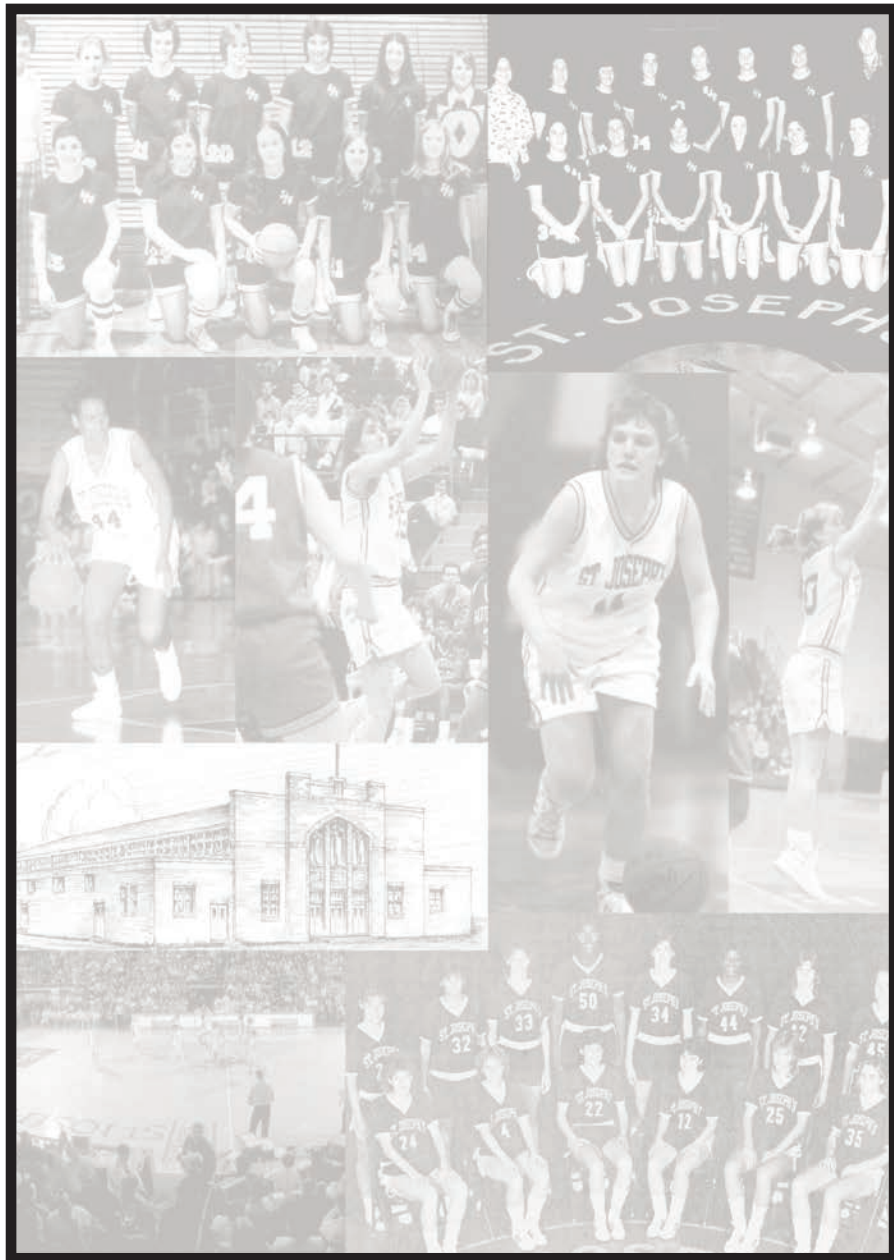

HISTORY & RECORDS

HAWKS BY THE NUMBERS

This season, Saint Joseph's begins its 46th year of Division I competition. Over that period, the Hawks have proven to be one of the premier programs in the conference, region and nation. The following is a numerical look at some of SJU's accomplishments.

3 – The highest *Associated Press* ranking the Hawks have earned. Saint Joseph's achieved that mark on March 16, 1977.

5 – Number of times a Hawk has led the Atlantic 10 in scoring. Current SJU associate head coach Susan Lavin led the conference for three straight years (1999-00 to 2001-02), while Dale Hodges led the league twice (1988-89 and 1989-90).

8 – Times the Hawks have hosted the Atlantic 10 Championship. Saint Joseph's hosted the conference tournament the previous two years before the A-10 Championship shifted venues to the Richmond Coliseum in 2014.

10 – The uniform number of former SJU standout and current associate head coach Susan Lavin. Her jersey was the second in Hawk history to be retired, as Saint Joseph's held a ceremony before its game against George Washington on February 24, 2008.

15 – The highest *USA Today* ranking Saint Joseph's has earned. The Hawks achieved this feat three times: February 26, 1985, March 5, 1985 and December 1, 1987.

21 – Former Hawk players inducted to the Big 5 Hall of Fame (complete list on page 78). Saint Joseph's first head coach, Ellen Ryan, was inducted into the Big 5 Hall of Fame as an administrator in 2003.

28 – Postseason bids earned by Saint Joseph's. The Hawks have made four AIAW, 13 NCAA and 10 WNIT appearances. SJU is 25-30 all-time in postseason contests.

26 – Most wins in a season, set by the 1996-97 Hawks. Saint Joseph's finished 26-5 that year and earned a berth in the NCAA Tournament.

31 – Saint Joseph's players to go on to play professionally. The most recent, Amanda Fioravanti, is playing internationally in Northern Ireland.

33 – Victories over ranked opponents, including wins over #5 Maryland (50-49, 11/17/12) and #11 Dayton (61-53, 3/10/13) in 2012-13.

34 – Games played

40 – Winning seasons Saint Joseph's has posted in its first 45 seasons of Division I play. The Hawks enter their 46th season with a 841-464 all-time record.

44 – The first retired number in Hawk history - Dale Hodges. She remains the lone Saint Joseph's player to earn All-American First Team honors.

55 – Wins over Rhode Island, the most victories the Hawks have versus any opponent. Saint Joseph's is 55-8 all-time versus URI.

55 – Minutes played in the Hawks' triple-overtime victory over Villanova on December 4, 2008. Jenna Loschiavo set a new single-game record for minutes played as the guard played the entire contest.

63 – Hawks who have earned Atlantic 10 All-Conference honors.

67 – Points scored in the Hawks' first victory, a 67-30 win over Manor on January 20, 1974.

82 – All-Big 5 honorees. Only Angela Zampella and Susan Moran have earned the honor all four years of their careers.

119 – The most points scored by Saint Joseph's in a single game. The Hawks topped Glassboro State, 119-73, on January 12, 1978.

130 – The career games played mark held by Erin Shields (2010-14).



The first Saint Joseph's player to have her number retired, Dale Hodges finished her career as the all-time leader in scoring (2,077) and rebounding (1,049).

A four-time All-Big 5 selection, Angela Zampella's 788 career assists still stands as the all-time record for Saint Joseph's.

175 – SJU's record for blocks in a career, held by Stephanie McCaffrey (nee Graff). As a senior, she set a single-season record of 76 rejections.

189 – Student-athletes who have played a game for the Saint Joseph's women's basketball team. Nailah Delinois, Rachel Gartner, Elizabeth Marsicano, Katie Mayock, Devyne Newman and Ashlyn Wert will bring the number to 195.

309 – Most wins by a Hawks' head coach, held by current SJU head coach Cindy Griffin. She surpassed Jim Foster's mark of 248 with a 58-54 victory over Villanova on December 7, 2014.

572 – Career steals swiped by Saint Joseph's and Big 5 Hall of Famer Debbie Black. The Atlantic 10's all-time leader in the category as well, she still holds the top four SJU single-season marks and is 247 steals ahead of second place all-time (325).

623 – Days between Saint Joseph's home games on campus. The Hawks played their final game at Alumni Memorial Fieldhouse on March 8, 2008 against Xavier in the Atlantic 10 Tournament. Saint Joseph's began play at Michael J. Hagan '85 Arena on November 21, 2009 against UMBC. In between, the Hawks played their home games at Philadelphia University's Gallagher Center, The Palestra, and Drexel's Daskalakis Center during the 2008-09 season.

841 – Wins by the Hawks over their first 45 seasons of Division I play. Saint Joseph's became the 35th team to reach the 800-win mark with a victory over Richmond on January 13, 2016.

788 – Career assist record set by Angela Zampella (1998-01). She still holds three of the top 10 single-season marks in the category.

1,049 – Career rebounding record set by Dale Hodges (1987-90). She also holds the record for career rebounding average at 11.2 per game.

2,340 – Career points scored by all-time leading scorer Susan Moran (1999-02). The four-year starter surpassed the previous mark, set by Dale Hodges, on February 8, 2002 at Xavier.

3,200 – Previous capacity at Alumni Memorial Fieldhouse. Saint Joseph's played before a sellout crowd eight times, the most recent being a 56-48 win over Villanova on January 3, 2007.

3,500 – Average number of times The Hawk flaps its wings during a regulation basketball game as estimated by ESPN's "flap-o-meter."

3,759 – Career points scored at SJU by the current Saint Joseph's coaching staff of Cindy Griffin (662), Susan Lavin (2,340), and Katie Kuester (757).

4,200 – Capacity at Michael J. Hagan '85 Arena, which was dedicated on October 17, 2009.



Arguably the most famous mascot in college athletics, The Hawk has been flapping its wings for over 60 years. ESPN's "flap-o-meter" estimated that the Hawk flaps its wings 3,500 times per a game.

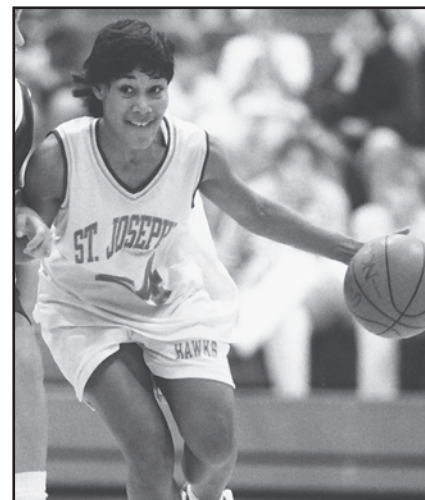

SJU WOMEN'S BASKETBALL HALL OF FAME



Cindy Anderson (1987-92)
1998 Inductee

One of the top playmakers in Hawk history, Cindy Griffin (nee Anderson) was inducted into the SJU Basketball Hall of Fame in 1998. A 1991 graduate of Saint Joseph's, she captained the Hawks for three seasons (1990-92).

In April of 2001, she returned to Hawk Hill as the seventh head coach in the program's history.

Griffin was selected to the All-Big 5 Second Team as both a junior and senior, while also earning third team All-Atlantic 10 honors in her final season. She helped the Hawks reach the first round of the NCAA Tournament in 1990. The team finished as Atlantic 10 runner-up in both 1990 and 1991. In the summer of 1989, Anderson was invited to try out for the East team at the U.S. Olympic Festival.

Griffin was forced to overcome a major injury after tearing her ACL during her freshman year and then redshirted the 1989 season. Despite her injury, she led the team in assists for three years (1990 through 1992) and steals during the 1991 season. She ranks among the school's career leaders in three-point field goal (.364) and free throw percentage (.763), as well as assists (510) and steals (197).

Following her playing career on Hawk Hill, Griffin served as a graduate assistant at SJU during the 1993 season, and was an assistant at Vanderbilt during the 1994 season. She is currently in her 18th season as head coach at Saint Joseph's.



Debbie Black (1984-88)
1994 Inductee

Arguably the top all-around female athlete in the history of Saint Joseph's University, Debbie Black helped to lead the Hawks to four consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances in the 1980s. Black was enshrined in the Saint Joseph's Basketball Hall of Fame in 1994, the Philadelphia Big 5 Hall of Fame in 1995 and the Saint Joseph's Athletics Hall of Fame in 2000.

A scrappy fireplug on the hardwood, Black led the Hawks to the first round of the NCAA Tournament in 1985, and the second round of the tournament in 1986, 1987 and 1988. SJU finished as runner-up at the Atlantic 10 Tournament in 1987 and 1988.

Highly decorated during her career, she was a member of the A-10 All-Rookie team as a freshman and made the All-District team in 1988. She was a three-time member of the A-10 All-Conference team, twice earning Second Team honors (1986-87) and garnering First Team accolades as a senior. Black was a member of the A-10 All-Tournament Team as both a junior and a senior. A three-time First Team All-Big 5 selection, she was named Big 5 MVP in 1988. The Hawks won three Big 5 crowns with her at the controls.

Known for her quick hands and deft passing skills, the former Hawk captain (1988) led the team in steals from 1985-88 and assists from 1986-88. She still holds the school's career records in steals and ranks second in assists. Black topped the nation in steals during the 1986 season, while also ranking eighth in the country in assists.

In addition to her accomplishments on Hawk Hill, Black competed for the East Squad at the 1986 U.S. Olympic Festival. She also played on the U.S. Select team that won the gold medal at the 1985 R. William Jones Cup. She went on to play professionally in Australia and also for the Colorado Xplosion of the American Basketball League. She retired in 2004 after six seasons in the WNBA.

A multi-sport standout, in addition to starring on the women's basketball team at Saint Joseph's, she captained the Hawk field hockey team and started at third base for the SJU softball team. Additionally, Black was inducted into the Philadelphia Sports Hall of Fame.



Robyne Bostick (1990-94)
2000 Inductee

A 1994 graduate of SJU, Robyne Bostick was enshrined in both the Philadelphia Big 5 and Saint Joseph's University Women's Basketball Halls of Fame in 2000. As a senior, Bostick led the Hawks in scoring (15.3) and rebounding (7.6). SJU's captain, she earned a multitude of awards following that season. She was named a Kodak District II All-American, First Team All-Atlantic 10 and Most Valuable Player of the Hawk Classic. Additionally, she was named the Big 5 Player of the Year and First Team All-Big 5. SJU won the Big Five crown and advanced to the NCAA Tournament that season.

Bostick helped to lead SJU to a Big 5 title every year she suited up for the Crimson and Gray. She was the Big 5 Rookie of the Year in 1991. She currently ranks 19th on SJU's career rebound list with 481 and 10th on the all-time field goal percentage list (.494).

After her collegiate career ended, she went on to play professionally in Luxembourg.

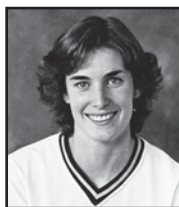


Erin Brady (2002-04)
2016 Inductee

An All-Atlantic 10 and two-time All-Big 5 performer, Erin Brady Miles '04 was inducted into the Saint Joseph's University Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in 2016.

A high-scoring guard, Brady led the Hawks to an appearance in the Atlantic 10 title game (2003) as well as back-to-back trips to the WNIT (2003, 2004). As a senior, she served as team captain, averaging 10.7 points and 3.4 assists. That season, she garnered both Second Team All-Big 5 and Atlantic 10 All-Conference Third honors. As a junior, she was recognized as team MVP and earned Second Team All-Big 5 accolades after averaging 11.8 points, 5.3 assists and 2.1 steals.

A native of Weatherly, Pennsylvania (Marian Catholic), Brady transferred to SJU after playing two seasons at American University. She would go on to play professionally in both Ireland and Australia.



Trish Brown (1981-85)
1990 Inductee

Saint Joseph's all-time leading scorer and rebounder when she graduated, Trish Brown helped guide the Hawks to their first-ever NCAA Tournament berth in 1985. A 1985 SJU grad, she was inducted into the Saint Joseph's Basketball Hall of Fame in 1990, the Philadelphia Big 5 Hall of Fame in 1992, and the Saint Joseph's Athletics Hall of Fame in 2004.

The Hawks' captain as a senior, Brown was an A-10 All-Second Team pick in 1983, and was a First Team selection in 1984 and 1985. She earned First Team All-Big 5 honors her sophomore, junior and senior seasons.

A force on the boards, she led the team in rebounding for three seasons (1982-84) and also paced the squad in scoring during the 1984 and 1985 seasons. She also set a then SJU single-game record with 21 rebounds versus Rutgers (January 10, 1983).

SJU WOMEN'S BASKETBALL HALL OF FAME



Teresa Carmichael (1983-87)
1993 Inductee

The third all-time leading scorer (1,671) and second leading rebounder (982) in SJU history, Teresa Carmichael was inducted into the Saint Joseph's Basketball Hall of Fame in 1993, the Philadelphia Big 5 Hall of Fame in 1994 and the Saint Joseph's Athletics Hall of Fame in 2000. A two-time All-Big 5 First Team pick in 1986 and 1987, she also twice garnered All-Atlantic 10 honors. The Hawks' captain as a senior, she became the first player in school history to lead the team in both scoring and rebounding in consecutive seasons, achieving the feat in both 1986 and 1987. She was also the first Hawk player to score 500 points in a single season.

Carmichael helped the Crimson and Gray to three straight NCAA Tournament appearances during the 1980s, advancing to the first round in 1985 and the second round in both 1986 and 1987. SJU also captured three Big 5 titles during her tenure. She was the team's Most Valuable Player in 1986 and was named to the American Women's Sports Federation All-America Checklist Second Team as a center that year.



Maureen Costello (1994-98)
2005 Inductee

A four-year letterwinner for the Hawks, Maureen Costello helped Saint Joseph's to two NCAA appearances and two City Series titles during her career. As a senior, Costello earned Atlantic 10 All-Conference First Team honors and was named the 1998 Big 5 Most Valuable Player. Costello still stands among the program's elite, ranking 10th in scoring (1,299 points), third in rebounding (952) and 10th in free throws made (333). She was inducted into the Big 5 Hall of Fame in December 2004.



Melissa Coursey (1995-99)
2012 Inductee

Helping Saint Joseph's to 84 wins from 1995-99, Melissa Coursey was a key contributor in the Hawks A-10 and Big 5 championship runs in 1997 and 1999. A four-year letterwinner, Coursey turned in her best season as a senior, earning First Team All-Big 5 honors and A-10 Championship MVP accolades.

One of the top perimeter players in SJU history, Coursey currently ranks fourth all-time in career three pointers (210) and is 19th overall in scoring (1,047 points). Earning All-Big 5 Second Team honors as a junior, she finished the year with 81 three pointers - fifth most in a single season - and set the single-game record with nine three pointers against both Penn and Rhode Island. She'd top her single-season best the following year, capping it with the second-most three pointers in a season with 84. Coursey was inducted into the Philadelphia Big 5 Hall of Fame in 2012.



Audrey Codner (1990-94)
2006 Inductee

A four-year letterwinner for the Hawks, Audrey Codner helped Saint Joseph's to four straight City Series titles and an appearance in the 1994 NCAA Tournament. A two-time Atlantic 10 All-Conference and All-Big 5 honoree, Codner finished her career seventh all-time in scoring (1,092) and 10th in rebounds (491). In 2001, Codner was inducted into the Big 5 Hall of Fame.



Mégan Compain (1993-97)
2015 Inductee

Among the most dynamic players in program history, Mégan Compain topped the Hawks in scoring in three consecutive seasons, while leading SJU to the postseason in each of the Wanganui, New Zealand native's four seasons, including three trips to the NCAA Tournament (1994, 1995, 1997). In addition, SJU captured three Philadelphia Big 5 titles.

A three-time All-Atlantic 10 selection, garnering First Team honors as a senior, she was named the A-10 Championship's Most Valuable Player in 1997 after leading the Hawks to their first Conference title. A three-time First Team All-Big 5 honoree, Compain was named the City Series Player of the Year in 1997 and was later inducted into the Big 5 Hall of Fame in 2003.

Currently seventh on SJU's all-time scoring list with 1,497 points, she also ranks among the program's all-time leaders in rebounds, field goals, three-point field goals and free throws made. She finished 14th in the nation in free throw shooting (85.6 percent) in 1996 and her career free throw percentage of 82.4 percent was the highest in program history when she graduated.

Professionally, Compain became the first Hawk to play in the WNBA, signing a free agent contract with the Utah Starzz. Overall, she spent eight years playing abroad, including stints in Finland, Germany, Wales and New Zealand. Internationally, she represented New Zealand at both the 2000 Olympics in Sydney and the 2004 Olympic games in Athens.



Katie Curry (1989-93)
1999 Inductee

A 1993 graduate of Saint Joseph's University, Katie Gardler (nee Curry) was inducted into both the Philadelphia Big 5 and SJU Basketball Halls of Fame in 1999 and the SJU Athletics Hall of Fame in 2005. One of the nation's most feared shooters, Gardler led the Hawks in scoring from 1990-91 through 1992-93.

After redshirting her freshman year with a knee injury, Gardler started for the Hawks for four seasons, earning Second Team All-Atlantic 10 honors in 1991 and First Team accolades in 1992 and 1993. As a senior, she was named the A-10's MVP after averaging 17.9 points, 3.1 rebounds 3.8 assists and 3.1 steals per game. She also was an All-District selection and earned All-Big 5 First Team accolades three years in a row (1991-93).

A co-captain as a junior and senior, Gardler led the Hawks to the NCAA Tournament in 1990 and helped SJU win the Big 5 title in each of her four seasons, posting a 15-1 record during that span.

Gardler's 1,663 points still rank fourth all-time in Hawk history, while her scoring average of 14.2 points stands fifth. A lethal three-point threat, she competed in the National Three-Point Shooting contest her senior year. She finished her Hawk career as the leader in both three-point field goals made (216) and attempted (621), knocking down almost 35 percent of those shots. A "ball-hawk" defensively, she is second in Hawk history with 325 career steals. Gardler set an A-10 record during the 1990-91 season with 23 points in the second half during a game with Rutgers. Gardler was selected to the 1990 East team that competed at the US Olympic Festival.

SJU WOMEN'S BASKETBALL HALL OF FAME



Jessi Dunne (1981-85)
1991 Inductee

A two-time Hawk captain (1984-85), Jessi Dunne was inducted into the Saint Joseph's University Basketball Hall of Fame in 1991. A crafty playmaker, she led the Hawks in assists for three straight seasons (1983-85). She also led the team in both steals and blocks in 1983 and 1984. In her senior year, she helped SJU to its first-ever NCAA Tournament appearance.

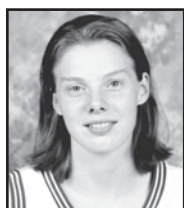


Renie Dunne (1978-82)
1989 Inductee

The spunky point guard who directed the Hawk attack in the early 1980s, Renie Shields (nee Dunne), was inducted into the SJU Basketball Hall of Fame in 1989, the Philadelphia Big 5 Hall of Fame in 1991 and the Saint Joseph's Athletics Hall of Fame in 2001. The 1982 SJU graduate earned All-Big 5 honors three times and was named Big 5 MVP in 1981 after handing out a then-SJU single season record 157 assists and averaging 10.8 points per game.

A versatile performer, the two-time captain (1981-82) led the Hawks in scoring (1982), assists (1981-82), and steals (1981-82) during her career. Dunne's 14 versus Penn State in 1981 was a team record until it was passed in 2000.

Still active in Big 5 women's basketball, she had a successful coaching career as well, serving as an assistant at SJU from 1988-93 and also at Villanova. She was promoted to associate athletic director for varsity programs and senior women's administrator at Saint Joseph's in September 2012 and is in her 26th year as a color commentator for the broadcasts of Hawk home games.



Amy Facer (1993-97)
2014 Inductee

Among the most versatile guards in Saint Joseph's Amy Facer was inducted into the program's Hall of Fame in 2014. SJU advanced to the postseason in each of Facer's four seasons, including three trips to the NCAA Tournament (1994, 1995, 1997). In addition, the Hawks captured three Philadelphia Big 5 titles, as well as the program's first Atlantic 10 Championship in 1997.

Individually, Facer was a two-time All-Atlantic 10 selection, garnering Third Team honors in 1995 and Second Team accolades in 1997. Furthermore, the two-time A-10 All-Championship team choice was named All-Big 5 three times, including First Team in 1997. She won a gold medal as a member of the East Team at the 1995 U.S. Olympic Festival. Facer finished her career with 1,138 points. After graduating from SJU, Facer spent 11 years playing professionally in Europe and the Middle East, including stints in Denmark, Hungary, Romania, Spain, Sweden and Israel.



Kim Foley (1985-89)
1995 Inductee

A three-time Academic All-American for the Hawks in the late 1980s, Kim Foley is a member of the SJU Basketball (1995), the Philadelphia Big 5 (1995), and SJU Athletics (2003) Halls of Fame. A 1989 graduate of Saint Joseph's University, the Hawks advanced to the NCAA Tournament in each of her four seasons, reaching the second round her final three years.

A standout in the classroom, Foley was named a third team Academic All-American as a sophomore in 1987. She gained second-team accolades in 1988 and capped her career with first-team honors as a senior in 1989. She was also a member of the Academic All-District team each of those seasons. She was named to the Atlantic 10 Academic All-Conference team, three times (1986-87-88).

On the court, Foley burst onto the scene as a freshman earning A-10 All Rookie Team honors in 1985-86. As a junior in 1987-88, she was named both Second Team All-Big 5 and All A-10. As a senior, she garnered First Team accolades in both the Big 5 and A-10, as well as earning All-District team honors. A two-time Hawk captain, she was named the Jesuit College Player of the Year in 1988.

Among the Hawks' career leaders in numerous categories, Foley ranks fifth all-time in both points (1,651) and rebounds (808) and sixth all-time in blocked shots (80). Her career field goal percentage remains fourth all-time, while she currently sits ninth in scoring average. A starter in every game of her Hawk career, she is SJU's career leader in starts (124).

Following her stellar career on Hawk Hill, Foley went on to coach at Central Connecticut State and play basketball professionally in Australia.



Mary Sue Garrity (1974-78)
1984 Inductee

A high-scoring forward, Mary Sue Garrity provided the scoring punch for the nationally-ranked Hawk teams of the mid-1970s. Garrity was inducted into the Saint Joseph's Basketball Hall of Fame in 1984, the Philadelphia Big 5 Hall of Fame in 1989 and the Saint Joseph's Athletics Hall of Fame in 2000.

A 1978 SJU grad, she became the first Hawk to surpass 1,000 career points and was the first player in school history to lead the team in scoring four straight seasons. A playmaker as well, she also paced the team in assists for three seasons. A captain of the 1977-78 Hawks, she helped SJU to a third-place finish in the Eastern Region of the AIAW Tournament in both 1976 and 1978. In 1977, SJU was runner up in the Eastern Region and took sixth place at the national tournament.

Off the court, she was also a star on the Finnesey Field turf as a member of the inaugural women's field hockey team at SJU. Additionally, Garrity is the daughter of former SJU men's basketball standout Ed Garrity.



Stephanie Graff (2000-04)
2011 Inductee

Perhaps the most intimidating defensive player in Hawk history, Stephanie McCaffrey (nee Graff) finished her playing career as the single game (seven), season (76) and career (175) leader in blocked shots. A two-time Atlantic 10 All-Championship Team selection, the forward finished her career sixth in total rebounds (788) and 12th in career scoring (1,193).

A 2003-04 Atlantic 10 All-Conference Second Team and A-10 All-Defensive Team honoree, she helped Saint Joseph's post an 80-43 record and earn three consecutive appearances in the Postseason WNIT over her four seasons. A two-time Academic All-District II and A-10 All-Academic Team selection, McCaffrey became the 19th women's basketball player from Saint Joseph's to play professionally as she joined the University of Limerick/Auginish of the Irish Women's SuperLeague in 2004. McCaffrey also helped the Hawks to eight postseason appearances, including the 2013 A-10 title, while a member of the SJU staff from 2005-18.

SJU WOMEN'S BASKETBALL HALL OF FAME



Dale Hodges (1987-90)
1996 Inductee

One of the greatest players in Saint Joseph's history, Dale Hodges holds over 25 school records, including the career standard for rebounds (1,049), while ranking second in points (2,077). She still holds Hawk single-game records for both points (42) and boards (21) and was the first female athlete in SJU history to have her number (44) retired. A 1990 SJU grad, she was inducted into both the Big 5 and Saint Joseph's Basketball Halls of Fame in 1996 and the Saint Joseph's Athletics Hall of Fame in 1999.

After sitting out her freshman year for NCAA eligibility requirements, Hodges led the team in scoring, rebounding and blocks for three consecutive seasons (1988-90) - the only Hawk to ever do so - and led the team in steals her final two years. She earned First Team All-Big 5 and All-Atlantic 10 honors each of her three seasons and was twice was honored as the A-10 and Big 5 Player of the Year and an All-District standout (1989-90). As a senior, Hodges earned First Team All-American honors, being named to the Kodak, USWBA and the Naismith squads. That year she finished third nationally in scoring (27.6 ppg) and 13th in rebounding (13.0 rpg).

With Hodges leading the way, SJU advanced to the NCAA Tournament three straight seasons, twice making it to the second round. The Hawks won Big 5 titles in 1988 and 1990.

Hodges went on to a professional career in Italy, Japan, and Spain as well as playing for the New England Blizzard of the ABL. On two occasions, she represented the United States in international competition, playing on the Jones Cup team in 1988 and the World University Games team in 1991.



Kathy Langley (1974-78)
1988 Inductee

One of the focal points of the high-scoring Hawk teams of the late 1970s, Kathy Langley was inducted into the Saint Joseph's University Basketball Hall of Fame in 1988. She served as team captain during the

1978 season, and led the team in rebounding during the 1975 season. She ranks 13th all-time in career rebounding (580), while her average of 7.3 boards per game is ninth on the SJU list. She helped SJU to a third-place finish in the Eastern Region of the AIAW Tournament in 1976 and 1978. In 1977, the Hawks were runners-up in the Eastern Region and took sixth place at the national tournament.



Mary Maley (1973-77)
1987 Inductee

A standout for the first four women's varsity teams at SJU, Mary Maley played under legendary former SJU head coaches Ellen Ryan, Theresa Greutz and Rene Portland during her career. A 1977 grad, she was enshrined in the school's Basketball Hall of Fame in 1987. Serving as team captain as both a junior and a senior, she led the team in rebounding during the 1974 season.

Her Hawk squads went 60-11 and were ranked among the top 10 nationally. She helped SJU to a third-place finish in the Eastern Region of the AIAW Tournament in 1976, while in 1977 it was the runner-up in the Eastern Region and took sixth place at the national tournament. season as head coach at Saint Joseph's.



Jana Lichnerova (1996-00)
2017 Inductee

An Olympian and the Atlantic 10 Player of the Year in 2000, Jana Lichnerova was inducted into the Saint Joseph's University Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in 2017.

Possessing a unique combination of size, skill and toughness, the Bratislava, Slovakia native proved to be the ultimate winner during her Saint Joseph's career, leading the Hawks to a pair of Atlantic 10 Championships (1997, 1999), three Big Five titles (1997, 1999, 2000) and three NCAA Tournament appearances.

A starter in all 116 games that she played during her career, Lichnerova was named both the A-10 Player and Student-Athlete of the Year as a senior. She also garnered First All-A-10 and Big 5 recognition that season. For her career, she was a two-time All-Big 5 and All-A-10 honoree, as well as a two-time Academic All-Big 5 selection. She still ranks among SJU's career leaders in points (1,158), rebounds (665), steals (168) and three-point field goal percentage (38.1%).

After graduating, Lichnerova represented Slovakia at the 2000 Olympics in Sydney, helping the team to a seventh place finish, as well as at the European Championships. She has also gone on to a long and successful professional career. A fourth round selection in the 2000 WNBA Draft by the Minnesota Lynx, she has spent 15 years playing across Europe, including stints in Austria, France, Hungary, Italy and the Czech Republic.



Chrissy McGoldrick (1975-78)
1985 Inductee

A tenacious rebounder, Chrissy McGoldrick keyed the frontcourt for the nationally-ranked Hawk teams of the late 1970s. She was inducted into the SJU Basketball Hall of Fame in 1985, the Big 5 Hall of Fame

in 1989 and the Saint Joseph's Athletics Hall of Fame in 2001. She led the team in rebounding during the 1976 and 1977 seasons and ended her career with a then school record 675 rebounds (8.9 rebounds per game). A scorer as well as a rebounder, her 916 career points ranked second at the time. Her 1977 team finished with 23-5 record and #3 ranking in the final AP poll. That team later advanced to the AIAW National Championships, finishing sixth overall. In addition, both the 1976 and 1978 squads placed third in the AIAW Regional Tournament with the 1978 squad finishing No. 11 in the nation. Overall, the squad registered a remarkable 65-12 record during her tenure. A multi-sport standout, in addition to starring on the women's basketball team, she also was a three-year varsity field hockey standout.



Terri Mohr (1984-86)
1992 Inductee

Regarded as one of the best perimeter players in SJU history, Terri Mohr posted two standout seasons for the Hawks after transferring from Auburn in 1984.

A 1986 graduate, she was inducted into the SJU Basketball Hall of Fame in 1992, the Big 5 Hall of Fame in 1993 and the SJU Athletics Hall of Fame in 2011.

The Hawks' captain as a senior, she was a two-time All-Big 5 First Team pick (1985 and 1986), as well as a Second Team All-A-10 choice those years. The Hawks made it to the first round of the NCAA Tournament in 1985 and the second round in 1986. She was named co-winner of the South Jersey Female Athlete of the Year in 1986.

Mohr joined Jim Foster's staff after graduation, and served as an assistant coach from 1986-88, and later followed Foster to Vanderbilt.

SJU WOMEN'S BASKETBALL HALL OF FAME



Susan Moran (1998-02)
2008 Inductee

A four-year standout on the court for the Hawks from 1998-2002, Susan Lavin (nee Moran) was inducted into the SJU Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in 2008.

Helping the Hawks to two NCAA Tournament appearances and the 1999 Atlantic 10 Championship, she was a four-time A-10 All-Conference and Big 5 honoree. An All-American Honorable Mention as a senior, Lavin collected A-10 and Big 5 Player of the Year accolades, and A-10 Student-Athlete of the Year and Academic All-America. Starting all 122 games over her four seasons, she is the only Hawk in SJU history to lead her team in scoring and rebounding all four seasons. She capped her career as the all-time leading scorer with 2,340 points. On February 24, 2008, Lavin became only the second Hawk in program history to have her jersey (#10) retired.

The current Hawk associate head coach was inducted into the Big 5 Hall of Fame in January 2009 and the SJU Athletics Hall of Fame in 2010.



Anne "Muffet" O'Brien (1973-77)
1986 Inductee

One of the original "Hawkettes," Anne "Muffet" (nee O'Brien) McGraw directed the offense for the first four Hawk varsity women's basketball teams. She played under legendary SJU head coaches Ellen Ryan, Theresa Grentz and Rene Portland during her career. A 1977 SJU grad, she was enshrined in the school's Basketball Hall of Fame in 1986, the Philadelphia Big 5 Hall of Fame in 1990, the Saint Joseph's Athletics Hall of Fame in 2002, the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in 2011 and the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in 2017.

The Hawks' captain as both a junior and senior, she averaged 7.9 points, 3.5 assists and 3.1 steals over her four-year career. Her Hawk squads posted an astounding 60-11 record and were ranked among the top 10 nationally. She helped SJU to a third-place finish in the Eastern Region of the AIAW Tournament in 1976, while in 1977 it was runner-up in the Eastern Region and took sixth place at the national tournament.

O'Brien, who is currently the head coach at Notre Dame, led the Irish to national titles in 2001 and 2018. Prior to heading to the Midwest, she spent five years as the head coach at Lehigh University. She began her college coaching career at her alma mater as an assistant coach under Jim Foster during the 1980 and 1981 seasons. Prior to beginning her coaching career she played one season for the California Dreams of the Women's Professional Basketball League (1980).



Carol Polachek (1979-83)
1990 Inductee

Carol Polachek graduated from Saint Joseph's in 1983 and was inducted into the school's basketball Hall of Fame in 1990.

She captained the Hawks during the 1982-83 season, and is 24th on the career points list with 975. She is considered to be one of the best perimeter shooters in Saint Joseph's history.



Ellen Shields (1986-90)
1997 Inductee

One of the most accurate shooters in Hawk history, Ellen Shields still holds the SJU career record for three-point efficiency (40.4 percent). Shields was inducted into both the Philadelphia Big 5 and Saint Joseph's Basketball Halls of Fame in 1997, and the SJU Athletics Hall of Fame in 2006.

A two-time Hawk captain (1989 and 1990), she helped SJU to four consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances, as the team advanced to the second round three times. SJU also claimed three Big 5 titles (1987-88-90) during her tenure, while finishing as Atlantic 10 Tournament-runner up those same three seasons.

An A-10 All-Rookie team pick as a freshman, she was named to the All-Atlantic 10 Third Team as a junior. Shields was also named an "Unsung Hero" by the Big 5 that year. Her senior year, she garnered First Team All-A-10 and All-Big 5 honors. She received the team's Most Improved Player award in both 1988 and 1989.

In addition to her long-range accuracy, Shields ranks sixth on the career free throw percentage list (81.0 percent). She holds the Hawk record for consecutive free throws made with 35 straight in 1989.

Additionally, she served as SJU's director of basketball operations from 2007 to 2010.



Angela Zampella (1997-01)
2013 Inductee

A three-time Big 5 First Team selection, Angela Zampella (1997-01) led the Hawks to three Big 5 titles and a pair of NCAA Tournament appearances during her career at SJU. A four-year starter, Zampella made an immediate impact as a rookie in 1997-98, helping the Hawks to a WNIT appearance, while being selected to the All-Big 5 Second Team.

One of just two Hawks to garner Atlantic 10 All-Conference honors every season of her career, Zampella led the Hawks to an A-10 Championship in 1999 and an NCAA Tournament at-large berth in 2000. Saint Joseph's all-time leader in assists (788), she currently ranks sixth all-time in scoring (1,509 points), fifth in steals (216), sixth in three-pointers made (184) and 16th in rebounding (521). A member of the 2000 USA R. William Jones Cup Team that won gold in Taiwan, Zampella still holds the SJU single-season record for assists (241 in 1999-00) and assists in a game (17). Following her SJU career, Zampella continued to play professionally in Italy.

Jersey Retired February 24, 2008

An Honorable Mention All-American as a senior, Susan Moran went on to collect A-10 and Big 5 Player of the Year accolades, along with A-10 Student-Athlete of the Year and Academic All-America honors in 2002.

The only Hawk to lead her team in scoring and rebounding all four seasons, Moran capped her career as the all-time leading scorer with 2,340 points.

Enshrined into the Big 5 Hall of Fame in January of 2009, Moran became the 12th member of the women's basketball team to be named to the SJU Athletics Hall of Fame on October 16, 2010.



44 Dale Hodges • 1987-90

Jersey Retired December 28, 1999

One of the greatest players in Saint Joseph's women's basketball history, Dale Hodges still holds over 25 school records 20 years after her final game in Crimson and Gray.

A two-time Atlantic 10 Player of the Year, Hodges earned A-10 All-Conference First Team honors all three seasons and was twice picked Big 5 Player of the Year. As a senior, she became the first Hawk to earn All-American honors as she was selected to the Kodak, USBWA and Naismith First Teams.

Inducted into both the Big 5 and Saint Joseph's Women's Basketball Halls of Fame in 1996, Hodges was part of the inaugural SJU Athletics Hall of Fame class in 1999.

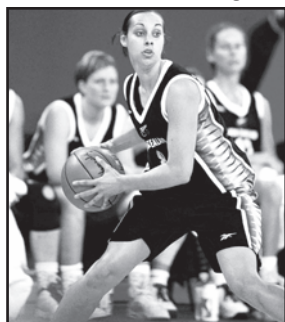

HAGAN ARENA / ALUMNI MEMORIAL FIELDHOUSE

Michael J. Hagan '85 Arena

A new era of Saint Joseph's basketball began in 2009-10, with the opening of the Michael J. Hagan '85 Arena. The culmination of a 16-month project of the expanding and renovating of Alumni Memorial Fieldhouse, Hagan Arena has a capacity of 4,200, which is an increase of 1,000 from the Fieldhouse. It has many more amenities to enhance the Saint Joseph's fan experience, while providing the basketball program with a top-notch facility that still preserves the homecourt advantage enjoyed for so many years at Alumni Memorial Fieldhouse.

Among the amenities now in Hagan Arena are a video scoreboard, premium seating section with chair backs; an upper-level concourse with additional restrooms and concession stands; a fully air-conditioned arena; a will-call entrance as well as additional ticket entrances in the back of the arena; renovated visiting team locker rooms; and an expanded media room.

Michael J. Hagan '85, and his wife, Joyce, are the lead benefactors for the most comprehensive enhancement of athletic facilities in Saint Joseph's history.

Hagan Arena was dedicated on October 17, 2009, with the inaugural game taking place on November 13, 2009, as the Hawks' men's basketball team defeated Drexel, 77-67, in overtime. The first women's game was a 77-55 victory over UMBC on November 21, 2009.

Alumni Memorial Fieldhouse

Alumni Memorial Fieldhouse was the well-loved shrine and home of the Hawks for 35 seasons. With the completion of the multi-year expansion and renovation project that began in Spring 2008, this storied facility was preserved, while bringing the athletic complex to a level befitting such a venerable tradition. Beginning with the 2009-10 season, the new home of the Hawks became the Michael J. Hagan '85 Arena.

Alumni Memorial Fieldhouse was named for Saint Joseph's graduates who gave their lives in World War II. The building was dedicated on November 11, 1949, and 15 days later hosted its first men's basketball game, a 62-46 loss to Rhode Island. The women's team opened play at the Fieldhouse with a 59-24 loss to the defending national champion Mighty Macs of Immaculata on January 17, 1974.

Overall, the women's basketball team compiled a stellar 332-117 record (.739 winning percentage). Women's basketball came to the Fieldhouse as a Division I program in 1973. Former Hawk players and coaches include Theresa Grentz, Rene Portland, Jim Foster, Muffet McGraw O'Brien '77, and Geno Auriemma.

For much of the 1980s and 1990s, the Fieldhouse was the practice home of the NBA's Philadelphia 76ers. This was a natural extension of a legacy in which Saint Joseph's men's basketball products – George Senesky '43, Dr. Jack Ramsay '49, Jack McKinney '57, Paul Westhead '61, Jim Lynam '63, Matt Goukas '66, and Jim O'Brien '74 – would become head coaches in the NBA.

The 3,200-seat Fieldhouse played an even larger role in the University's history. Major events such as Commencement, the Hand-in-Hand Festival, and the annual Martin Luther King Day celebration have been held in the building, along with the centennial celebration of the College in 1951. Martin Luther King, Jr., spoke at the Fieldhouse in 1967.

Yet it is the passion of Hawk fans that stands as the greatest legacy of Alumni Memorial Fieldhouse. In 2003, *Sports Illustrated* listed "The 100 Things You Have to Do Before You Graduate." Ranked No. 12 was: "Go to a Saint Joseph's basketball game and shout 'The Hawk Will Never Die!' – the most defiant cheer in college sports."

PHILADELPHIA BIG 5

On November 23, 1954 the administrations of the five major Universities in the Philadelphia area agreed to formulate a partnership between their athletic departments. They agreed to participate in a men's basketball round robin, the "City Series," at The Palestra on the University of Pennsylvania's campus. The Big 5 was born. Created during the 1980 season, the Philadelphia Big 5 women's basketball City Series begins its 32nd year of competition in 2012-13. For over 50 years, this partnership has remained intact and defines Philadelphia's collegiate sports tradition, with heated rivalries and fierce competition on the court, partnership and camaraderie off the court. The Philadelphia Big 5 even beat out Rocky Balboa to be named the City's "Best Sports Tradition" in the *Philadelphia Daily News*!

ATLANTIC 10

On March 2, 1975, the idea of what is now the Atlantic 10 Conference was conceived. What started as an eight-school, men's basketball-only affiliation has grown into a 14-university, 21-sport league that is universally hailed as one of the best conferences in the country.

That growth and prominence is a direct result of the ideals and commitments of the member institutions of the Atlantic 10 – Davidson College, The University of Dayton, Duquesne University, Fordham University, George Mason University, The George Washington University, La Salle University, University of Massachusetts, University of Rhode Island, University of Richmond, St. Bonaventure University, Saint Joseph's University, Saint Louis University and Virginia Commonwealth University.

The Atlantic 10 was proactive in navigating sweeping conference realignment, adding Davidson College, George Mason University and Virginia Commonwealth University. The additions have proven successful with all three institutions winning regular season and tournament championships. The addition of strong academic institutions with basketball-centric, robust athletic programs added to a league that is united and strengthened by the diversity of its member institutions. Each is extraordinary in its educational mission, whether of a Catholic faith, a private university or a land grant institution. The varied pursuits of each member prove that there are many threads that weave the fabric for a great conference.

The Atlantic 10 Conference, with a total population of over 76.5 million people within its geographic footprint of eight states and the District of Columbia, will crown champions in 21 sports this year: baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, field hockey, men's golf, women's lacrosse, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track & field, women's rowing, men's and women's soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming & diving, men's and women's tennis, and women's volleyball.

The presidents and chancellors of Atlantic 10 institutions, in conjunction with Atlantic 10 Commissioner Bernadette V. McGlade, have made a strong commitment to making the academic and athletics equation a successful one. Over the years, the league membership has strived to better recognize the academic accomplishments of its student-athletes. The Commissioner's Honor Roll, which cites every Atlantic 10 student-athlete with a 3.5 grade point average or better, recog-

nized 3,582 student-athletes in 2016-17, a record the A-10. The league sponsors Academic All-Conference teams in each of its sports and honors two student-athletes as the A-10 Scholar-Athletes of the Year. Moreover, the Atlantic 10 provides \$70,000 in postgraduate scholarships awards to 14 student-athletes, one from each campus.

The conference annually earns high marks in the NCAA academic metrics. This includes graduating its student-athletes at 92 percent rate for the men basketball and a league-record 97 percent rate for women's basketball according to the NCAA's most recent Graduation Success Rate (GSR) figures. There were a record 68 A-10 teams singled out for public recognition (honoring teams in the top 10 percent) for their Academic Progress Rate (APR) scores by the NCAA in the Spring of 2017.

Success on the playing field has mirrored the A-10's classroom prowess, with the league earning postseason bids in each of its 21 sports, including three men's soccer bids last fall and 10 men's and women's basketball bids in 2017-18. Last fall, Fordham made its own magic with a trip to the NCAA Men's Soccer Elite Eight. UMass senior Heather MacLean also reached All-American status with her performance at NCAA Cross Country Championships.

Saint Joseph's celebrated the third Atlantic 10 Championship in team history in 2013 as the Hawks topped Fordham, 47-46, at the Barclays Center in Brooklyn, New York. The conference tournament will be held at the A.J. Palumbo Center on the campus of Duquesne University in 2019.

HAWK CLASSIC

Beginning in 1990, the Hawk Classic has been a staple of Saint Joseph's schedule. Over 23 years, the Hawks have advanced to the title game 22 times and have claimed the crown 10 times (1993, 1997, 1999, 2000, 2001, 2007, 2009, 2010, 2012, 2015 and 2017). Below are recaps of Saint Joseph's championship runs at the Hawk Classic.

- Saint Joseph's offense clicked throughout its two games it combined for 167 points en route to topping Saint Peter's and Eastern Illinois for the Hawk Classic title. Sarah Veilleux captured MVP honors, while teammates Chelsea Woods and Adashia Franklyn were both named to the All-Tournament Team.

- Hawk Classic MVP Ciara Andrews posted a game-high 25 point, including key free throws in the final minutes, to led SJU to a 76-66 victory over Central Michigan in the title game of the 2015 Annual Hawk Classic. Saint Joseph's set a Hagan Arena record in its opening 104-45 win over UMBC as All-Tournament selection Kathleen Fitzpatrick led five Hawks in double figures with 15 points.

- Backed by steady defense in its two matchups, Saint Joseph's claimed the 2012 Hawk Classic title with a 51-38 win over Fairfield in the opener and 79-38 victory over UMBC in the title game. SJU held the Stags and Retrievers to a combined 29.2 percent shooting (31-of-106), while MVP Erin Shields joined Natasha Cloud and Chatilla van Grinsven on the All-Tournament Team.

- Hanging on for a semifinal win over New Hampshire on a last-second layup by Michelle Baker, the Hawks cruised to a 75-40 win over Lafayette for the 2010 tournament title. Katie Kuester led the offensive charge for SJU, earning MVP accolades, while Ilze Gotfrida tallied a career-best 20 points in the title game to earn All-Tournament Team honors.

- Led by 2009 Hawk Classic MVP Ashley Prim, Saint Joseph's posted victories over Brown and Boston University to claim the seventh title for SJU. After dispatching Brown in the opening game, 65-36, the Hawks pulled away from the Terriers in the second half of the title game. SJU never allowed Boston University to come closer than four points in the second half as Prim became the first SJU rookie guard to post a double-double in points (18) and rebounds (11). Ashley Logue also garnered All-Tournament Team honors for Saint Joseph's.

- In 2007, Saint Joseph's trailed for just the opening 3:01 of the championship game versus No. 15 Auburn, as the Hawks' offense put SJU up by 12 at the half. The Tigers posted a furious comeback that cut the Hawks' lead to just two, but Hawk Classic MVP Amy Wold came up big for SJU, answering with a three-pointer and grabbing a key offensive rebound in the final seconds to preserve the 71-69 win. Wold and All-Tournament Team honoree Sarah Acker combined for 33 of SJU's points on 13-of-23 shooting.

- Saint Joseph's rolled to its fifth Hawk Classic title in 2001, posting wins against Morgan State in the semifinals and Georgetown in the title game. Susan Moran averaged 27.0 points in the tournament and grabbed a record 16 boards in the championship game to capture Most Valuable Player honors. She was joined on the All-Tournament Team by Irina Krasnoshok and Amra Mehmedic.

- Saint Joseph's captured its fourth Hawk Classic title in 2000, posting wins against Central Connecticut State in the semifinals and Seton Hall in the title game. In the championship game, Angela Zampella poured in 24 points, dished eight assists and grabbed nine rebounds and was named tournament Most Valuable Player, garnering the honor for the third time. She was joined on the All-Tournament team by Moran.

- In 1999, SJU won its third Hawk Classic title, downing Air Force in the semifinals and beating Loyola Maryland in the title game. In the championship game, Moran netted a game-high 28 points to sprint past the Greyhounds, 74-54. In the semifinals against the Falcons, Zampella broke the then-SJU single game record for assists with 16, helping SJU to a 90-62 victory. Zampella was named tournament MVP and joined on the All-Championship squad by Moran and Jana Lichnerova.

- The Hawks captured the tournament title for the second time in 1997. Saint Joseph's defeated Alabama, 74-69 in overtime, in the championship game. Alabama built a 10-point lead in the second half but SJU chipped away until the score was knotted at the end of regulation. Zampella and Maureen Costello combined for 11 of the Hawks' 15 overtime points. Zampella was named tournament MVP while Lichnerova earned All-Tournament Team accolades.

- The Crimson and Gray captured the tournament title for the first time in 1993. The Hawks defeated 13th-ranked Virginia, 71-56, in the championship game. Robyne Bostick, the tournament MVP, led SJU with 23 points in the game.

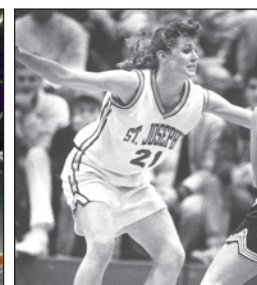

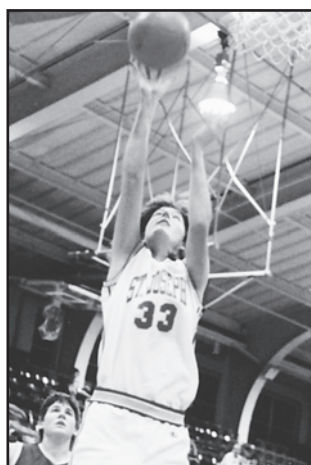

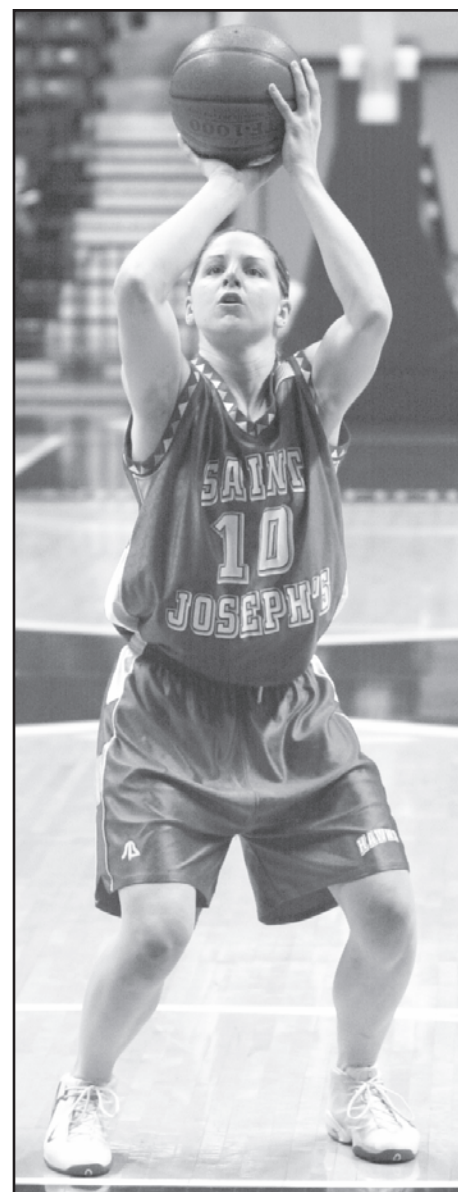

President

Mark C. Reed, Ed.D., became the 28th president of Saint Joseph's University in July of 2015. Since his arrival, Dr. Reed has prioritized sustaining and expanding academic quality and ensuring the University's financial strength through

sound management, collaboration and a progressive mindset.

In addition to securing the largest gift in University history—\$50M to primarily bolster endowment for both academic programs and student scholarships, Dr. Reed also recently negotiated a partnership with the adjacent, internationally-renown Barnes Foundation. The educational affiliation will sustain Barnes programming and allow for the expansion of Saint Joseph's art and cultural offerings.

His vision for Saint Joseph's takes shape in the University's new bold and forward-thinking strategic plan. Its implementation will secure SJU as a leading comprehensive liberal arts university with a broad academic portfolio; strong liberal arts and sciences core; prominent professional, co-curricular and athletic programs; and a campus that meets and exceeds the expectations of modern learners.

As President, Dr. Reed is deeply committed to understanding and attending to the experience of students, ensuring a rigorous and reflective education that leads graduates to fuller personal and professional lives. He spends time at the

heart of the enterprise teaching an undergraduate calculus course as a lecturer in the mathematics department. A product of Jesuit education, Dr. Reed believes in the University's Jesuit tradition and accepts a responsibility to steward its mission as central to his leadership.

Dr. Reed came to Saint Joseph's from Fairfield University in Fairfield, CT, where he served in multiple senior leadership roles over a fifteen-year tenure. An accomplished educator and administrator, Dr. Reed was involved in all aspects of academic and student life, as well as administration, enrollment management, finance, marketing, strategic planning, operations and external affairs.

Currently, Dr. Reed chairs the Council of Presidents for the Atlantic 10 Conference and serves on the Board of Directors for the American Council on Education (ACE), the Association of Catholic Colleges and Universities (ACCU), the Association of Independent Colleges and Universities of Pennsylvania (AICUP), and the City Avenue Special Services District. Additionally, he serves on the Board of Directors and the Executive Committee for the Association of Jesuit Colleges and Universities (AJCU), and is Vice Chair of the Board of Trustees for St. Joseph's Preparatory School in Philadelphia.

Dr. Reed received a B.S. in mathematics from Fairfield University, a master of education in secondary educational administration from Boston College, an MBA from Fairfield, and a doctorate of education in higher education management from the University of Pennsylvania.



Dr. Reed selected Jill Bodensteiner as director of athletics in March of 2018, marking the first appointment of a new AD in 30 years. She also became the first woman to hold the post at SJU.



Jill Bodensteiner

Director of Athletics

Jill Bodensteiner began her tenure as director of athletics at Saint Joseph's University on June 1, 2018, joining SJU after an impressive 20-year career at her alma mater, the University of Notre Dame. She will oversee the Hawks' 20 NCAA Division I men's and women's varsity sports and membership in the Atlantic 10 Conference.

Her appointment marked the first time in 30 years that a new athletics director had been chosen at SJU, while she is the first female in the school's history to hold the post. She succeeds Don DiJulia, who retired at the end of the 2017-18 academic year after serving his 50th year in college athletics and 35th as Saint Joseph's athletics director.

Bodensteiner's career at Notre Dame began in 1997 in the Office of the General Counsel, progressed to the athletic department in 2009, and culminated in her most recent role as senior associate athletics director five years ago.

Among her accomplishments, Bodensteiner provided oversight to Notre Dame's 26 intercollegiate athletics programs, 720 student-athletes and 70 coaches and served as sport administrator for the university's nationally renowned, and 2018 National Champion women's basketball program. She brings to Saint Joseph's strong NCAA leadership experience, having served on the Committee on Women's Athletics and the Division I Women's Basketball Committee. Working closely with LEAD1, the Atlantic Coast Conference and the NCAA, Bodensteiner played a key role in shaping the national debate and final legislation in areas including financial support for student-athletes, time management and academic conduct.

"This marks a new era in Saint Joseph's University's Athletics program, and I am proud that our university is continuing to make history in the most ground-breaking and forward-looking ways," said University President Mark C. Reed, Ed.D. "I could not be more enthusiastic about Jill's appointment and the experience, leadership and vision she brings to the position and to Saint Joseph's."

Dr. Reed added: "College athletics grounded in strong Jesuit education is a cornerstone of our history and tradition and a point of passion for thousands of our students, alumni and Hawks fans around the globe. A Notre Dame veteran like Jill understands this ethos and is perfectly suited to build on the highly successful program that Don DiJulia has stewarded."

At the announcement of her appointment on March 20, 2018, Bodensteiner said, "At an institution like Saint Joseph's, there needs to be a balance between tradition and innovation. I promise to work hard to preserve the tremendous tradition at St. Joe's, while always pushing us to think bigger and bolder."

"We will participate in athletics in a manner consistent with our Jesuit tradition. We will win the right way, by following rules, displaying great sportsmanship, and otherwise making our passionate fans proud to be Hawks," she continued. "We will demand that our student-athletes are students and that they aren't simply graduating, but that they are engaging academically, in student life, and in the community."

One of her first initiatives at Saint Joseph's was starting a bi-weekly podcast, "Jill on the Hill". Each episode of the podcast will feature segments with Saint Joseph's alumni in the sports industry; with current SJU student-athletes and coaches; and Bodensteiner's take on a relevant issue in college athletics.

Before joining the Notre Dame Office of the General Counsel in 1997, Bodensteiner specialized in employment litigation as an associate at two law firms, Seyfarth Shaw in Chicago and Bryan Cave LLP in St. Louis. A member of the bar in Indiana, Illinois and Missouri, she also clerked for the Honorable Catherine Perry, a United States District Court judge in St. Louis.

The native of Valparaiso, Indiana, received her bachelor's degree in psychology and sociology from Notre Dame, her juris doctorate from Washington University Law School in St. Louis, and her MBA from Notre Dame's Mendoza College of Business. She has been an active community service leader, serving as Chair of the Board of the YWCA North Central Indiana and volunteering with several other nonprofit organizations.

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Why S-a-i-n-t Joseph's University?

The corporate title "S-a-i-n-t" Joseph's University, which has been in place since Saint Joseph's was granted university status by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in 1979, is now the public title of the institution for all aspects of its operations. Previously, the abbreviation "St." Joseph's University was permitted in a number of alumni and athletic contexts.

The vast majority of academic and government publications have referred to Saint Joseph's University since at least 1986, as have most campus references with the exception of athletics. However, university-wide "image campaign" revealed the need to clarify this policy both internally and externally.

There are at least nine recognized "St. Joseph's" among the nation's colleges and universities. Only one of them – Saint Joseph's University, Philadelphia – is a university-level, Master's I, NCAA Division I institution. A complete spelling of Saint Joseph's University in all contexts will help eliminate any confusion among higher education and other public constituencies.

Style information for print, electronic and digital media is available at www.sju.edu/marcomm. It includes accepted abbreviations of the corporate name (e.g., "SJU" or "St. Joe's" in headlines or certain informal references) as well as prohibited usages (e.g., partial abbreviations such as "St. Joseph's" or "Saint Joe's").

MEDIA CREDENTIALS

Credentials for media covering Saint Joseph's at Hagan Arena should be made at least 24 hours in advance by contacting Jack Jumper.

Priority is given to daily newspapers, radio/TV stations and other media who cover Saint Joseph's and its opponents on a regular basis. Internet sites and agencies that will be considered for credentials include those of national cable networks or established publications. Internet sites representing local or regional media outlets will be provided credentials on a space-available basis. Websites that sponsor "message boards" or "chat rooms" where people are able to post anonymous information are ineligible for consideration of credentials. Credentials will only be issued to those 18 years of age and older.

PHOTO CREDENTIALS

All photographers attending Saint Joseph's home basketball games must be credentialed. Requests for credentials should be made in at least 24 hours in advance to Jack Jumper. Due to space demands, access to freelance photographers is limited.

SCOUT CREDENTIALS

Credentials for WNBA scouts must be requested at least 48 hours in advance of the game by contacting Jack Jumper.

RADIO POLICY

Access to phone lines is available for radio stations designated as the primary visiting outlet. ISDN, POTS and ethernet connections are available. Visiting radio stations wishing to broadcast the game should contact Jack Jumper at (610) 660-3389 or jjumper@sju.edu to make arrangements.

INTERVIEWS

All requests for interviews with Cindy Griffin and the Saint Joseph's players must be arranged through Jack Jumper. Advance notice of at least 24 hours is preferred, but every attempt will be made to accommodate all requests. Players will not be available for interviews on game day, except for post-game interviews.

PRESS ROW

Only accredited members of the media and accredited scouts will be issued credentials to cover Saint Joseph's basketball, and only those with passes will be permitted to sit in press seating. Members of the media are reminded that press row is a working area and cheering for either team will not be tolerated.

MEDIA SERVICES

Saint Joseph's and opponent's game notes, statistics, Atlantic 10 Conference notes and game programs will be available to working members of the media. Halftime statistics will be available in the media room at Hagan Arena and will also be distributed on press row. Final statistics will be distributed in the media room following completion of the game. Fax service is available at both locations.

Complete Saint Joseph's game notes will be available 24 hours prior to the game on SJUHawks.com.

MEDIA PARKING

Media parking is available at the ROTC Lot on 54th Street behind Hagan Arena. Media members desiring to be on the parking list must contact Jack Jumper at least 24 hours in advance of the game.

POST-GAME

Saint Joseph's head coach Cindy Griffin and select players will be available in the interview room following a post-game cooling off period. The Saint Joseph's locker room is not open to the media after the cooling off period.

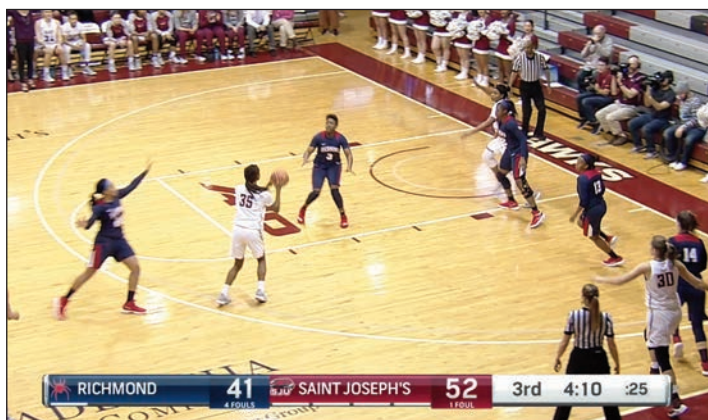
Hawks On TV

Saint Joseph's will once again benefit from the Atlantic 10's partnerships with ESPN, CBS Sports Network and NBC Sports Network as the Hawks are slated for two national television appearances in 2018-19.

Saint Joseph's home game versus La Salle (Jan. 20) will be broadcast on CBS Sports Network, while the Hawks' January 27 road contest at Dayton will air on ESPNU.

The 2018-19 season marks the sixth year of the long-term television agreement between the A-10 and ESPN, CBS Sports Network and NBCSN. Atlantic 10 institutions reside in states that comprise 33.3 million television households, approximately 30 percent of the total national media market. There are nine A-10 institutions in or adjacent to the top 25 media markets in the country.

The 2019 A-10 Championship will be hosted by Duquesne University on March 8-10, 2019, with the first round being held on Tuesday, March 5. The first-round games as well the championship quarterfinals will be available live on ESPN+, while the semifinal games will air on CBS Sports Network. ESPNU will air the A-10 championship final, the 22nd straight year an ESPN network has televised the league's title game.



Hawks Online

The Hawks' women's basketball program maintains a strong presence on the internet via the official website of Saint Joseph's Athletics, SJUHawks.com, and various social media platforms.

SJUHawks.com, a one-stop shop for all things Hawk athletics, contains updated statistics, game notes, and in-game live stats for all SJU home games and selected road games, while also hosting video segments featuring the women's basketball team.

Beginning with the 2018-19 athletic season, ESPN+ will be the home of all digital-only Atlantic 10 home events, including all women's basketball games not televised. ESPN+ will also be the exclusive home to all A-10 Olympic Sport championship events and the digital platform will carry the women's basketball quarterfinals (four games). This will supplement ESPN's coverage of Atlantic 10 women's basketball regular season games through the existing linear television partnership. An ESPN linear network will continue to air the A-10 Championship final of the women's championship.

Fans can also download the upgraded SJUHawks app, which is available for both the iPhone and Android. Among the highlights is a detail page that allows to easily access to scores, game information and other related content.

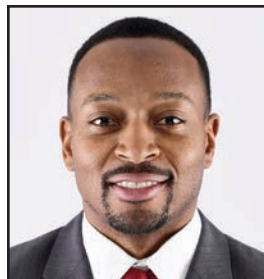
